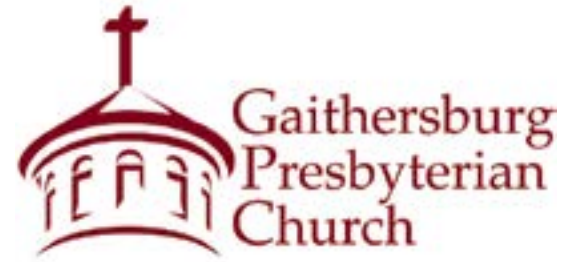

## GPP&K Celebrates 40 Years!

So I asked Cathy a few questions to help people appreciate the meaning of this milestone...

**TW:** *Cathy, how do you compare the school's mission today with that of 1976?*

**CF:** They're almost the same. It has always been a quality program to enrich children ages 3 to 5. Children still need to be loved and taught. We love their families, too.

**TW:** *Have those families changed over the last 40 years?*

**CF:** Parents today are busier. They are also more transient; they move at the drop of a hat! Many families have international origins, but all parents still want what is best for their children. They are seeking a religious program, education, and safety.

**TW:** *What do you see as leading challenges for the future?*

**CF:** Similar to what the church as a whole faces, we need to find common ground and meet the needs of people from different cultural backgrounds. Some of our families do not speak English at home. Some have different views on child-rearing.

## Music Notes

Since November 22, our organ and piano benches have been graced by the presence of our new Assistant Director of Music and Worship Arts, Paul Byssainthe, Jr. Most Sundays, he has drawn a crowd around the organ console during his difficult and well-played postludes. So far, we've heard Bach, Widor, Dupre, and Dale Wood. And from the piano, we have heard several of his own arrangements of hymn tunes and praise songs that are breathtakingly lovely. Most of you are aware that Paul has come to us from New York City, but I thought you might want to know a bit more about his background.

We know Paul as an accomplished organist, but he is also a conductor and composer. He is a graduate of Andrews University in Michigan, where he earned the Bachelor of Arts degree in Organ Performance and the Master of Music degree in Orchestral Conducting. During his time at Andrews, Paul served as a Graduate Conducting Assistant, conducting symphonic works by Tchaikovsky, Barber, Brahms, and operatic scores of Verdi. He participated in numerous choral and orchestral ensembles and was involved in leading contemporary music for many worship services. During his first week at Andrews, Paul had the wonderful fortune of meeting a beautiful young lady named Magdala, and they have been inseparable ever since. In 2011, they were married at Paul's former home church in Brooklyn, New York.

Before making the leap from New York to Maryland, Paul was a very busy man, indeed, providing musical leadership for Jewish, Seventh Day Adventist, and Roman Catholic congregations, including serving as Organist and Choir Director at St. Martin de Torres Parish in Brooklyn. He was also working as a piano instructor for the Lang Lang International Music Foundation's Keys of Inspiration Program at P.S. 46 in Harlem. In February 2015, Paul and three of his close friends launched a production company, Zamar Music Group, with a vision to provide Christ-centered music production and songwriting, as well as to provide worship leadership consulting and training to local churches.

Paul has been involved in music since a very young age, having been encouraged by his father, who is also a well-respected church musician in New York City. As a teenager, he was a multiple winner in the International Concert Alliance Piano Competition, held at Steinway Hall in Manhattan. Paul is also a two-time winner of the Piano Teachers' Congress of New York Piano Competition. He was privileged to take part in several music summer programs and All-State festivals, both as a cellist and a vocalist.

Paul is also a budding composer who has written several short pieces for piano and strings, and has arranged scores for various recording projects. He and Magdala are living in Hyattsville, and in his spare time, Paul enjoys playing basketball, reading, and traveling.

## January is Joyful at GPP&K!

We have *eleven* classes of Three-Year-Olds, Pre-K children, and Kindergarteners. We remain one of the *oldest* and *largest* schools of our kind in the area and are honored to minister to so many children and families in our community.

This month, our Three-Year-Old classes will learn how to make music. They will begin enjoying music with our own music teacher and will make their own musical instruments to take home.

The Four-Year-Old Pre-K classes will learn about hibernation and migration and what animals do in the winter. They will make an art portfolio using different kinds of art forms during their Art Unit.

All classes will play with “snow” (shaving cream) in their classrooms. They will learn that Jesus was the son of a carpenter and make something out of wood to take home during our Woodworking Unit. We greatly appreciate all of our parent volunteers who help to make these projects possible.

This month, our Kindergarten students will continue to use their *National Geographic Kids* magazines and observe animal wildlife habitats. For Art, they will study the works of Georgia O’Keeffe and use the book written and illustrated by Caroline Chang, who is the daughter of Judy Chang, one of our own staff members. The book teaches them about the life of this amazing artist. For Math, they will identify and review geometric solids and discuss the attributes of points, edges, and faces. They will celebrate the birthday of Martin Luther King, Jr. by hearing how he taught people to show respect for one another.

## Update from Rachel Simko, Our Missionary in Ecuador

By now, New Year's has come and gone and the Christmas decorations have been put away.

This month will look a little different than usual for me as I embark on a new project that I have long desired to pursue. With my roommate on furlough in the U.S. until February and so many other friends still away for their holiday travels and visits, I am taking the opportunity to stay out in Rio Bamba for several weeks. I have spoken of my knitting and crochet classes with the women in Columbe often enough, but there are countless other communities all around it, with small, one-room churches that were hand built by members of the community themselves. This month, for three weeks, I will be living out in a teeny-tiny manse-like situation and traveling out to five of the newest churches to paint murals on the walls behind their pulpits! I am very excited. Samson (my trusty missionary cat) will be coming with me because there is no one to take care of him in my absence, and also because I anticipate being a little lonely out in the hills. Our neighbors will be chickens and cows—neither of which has Samson ever encountered—so it should be interesting. My plan to paint all five murals while dressed in traditional Quichua garb, which I wear when I am out in indigenous communities, should be interesting as well.

I am also very happy to report that I am back in the black financially, thanks to the overwhelming support of everyone at GPC! Thanks so much to all of you! It is a huge blessing and such a great weight lifted off of me! I hope that everyone has had a happy new year so far and is sticking to their resolutions!

## Update from Norm Gordon, Bi-Vocational Bridge Leader

### Jesus Came For All – Despite the Labels!

As we set out to minister and discover God’s purpose among the religious “nones” –those with no church affiliation—I am continually drawn to the story of Jesus and the Samaritan Woman (John 4) and the number of labels that the two of them were up against: he was male, she was female; he was a Jew, she was a Samaritan; he worshiped in Jerusalem, she worshiped on the mountain of her ancestor Jacob. Labels, labels, labels. Jesus does not ignore the labels but one by one peels them away so that two spiritually minded individuals can have a conversation about connecting with a Living Savior.

I feel as if that’s my call: to peel away labels so that the spirit of Jesus can enter in and do His work. Exhibit A: we hosted a Christmas party in our home this Advent. There were lots of labels represented among the 10 families present: 14 Asians, 11 Caucasians, 2 Africans, and 7 of mixed descent. There were 13 adults, 12 teenagers, and 8 children. There were 8 Christian families, 1 Muslim family, and 1 Hindu family. But as we ate together, shared together, played Christmas games together, and sang carols together, I sensed the Spirit of the One who this season belongs to drawing folks in across the cultures, across the generations, and, yes, across the religious backgrounds. As Jesus said to the woman, “Salvation is from the Jews; but the hour is coming, and is now here, when the true worshipers will worship the Father in spirit and truth, for the Father seeks such as these to worship him.” (John 4:22–23) Labels define the tradition, the background, the culture, the practice. But they don’t define the heart, which is what Jesus seeks.

As the gathering wound down, one guest who had no church home agreed to get together with another disciple and me later on this week to talk some more about faith. No labels, just Jesus.

Thank you for your prayers as the Gordons continue to be among those with no church home and find avenues for God’s grace in the lives of those the Father seeks.

Thank you for your investment in this endeavor.

## Church Library Notes

In the 1940's, English author Rumer Godden came upon a small book of French poetry by Carmen Bernos de Gasztold, who lived in a Benedictine abbey in France. These poems impressed Rumer Godden so much that she decided to translate them into English and, with Bernos' cooperation, they became *Prayers from the Ark*. These 27 poems/prayers, each by a different creature in the ark, are touching, humorous, and profound. Many remind the reader of the Psalms.

Noah prays and asks the Lord to guide the ark to safety, saying, "Lord, what a menagerie! Between Your downpour and these animal cries one cannot hear oneself think!"

One of my favorites, the cat's prayer, says, in part: "Lord, I am the cat. I ask nothing of anyone – but if You have by some chance, in some celestial barn, a little white mouse or a saucer of milk, I know someone who would relish them."

*Bedside Treasury of Inspiration* by Helen and Horace Johnson is a compilation of thoughts on the wonders of life and living as expressed by over 100 great authors and thinkers, in poetry and prose.

*Divine Inspiration* by Robert Atwan features poetry from world literature focusing on Jesus' life and teaching.

*Eerdman's Book of Christian Poetry*, edited by Pat Alexander, is a treasury of poems with stories about their poets.

*The English Spirit* by Paul Handley includes poets ranging from the Venerable Bede in the 7th century to C. S. Lewis and other 20th century figures.

*God's Treasury of Virtues* is a collection of stories, quotes, hymns, scriptures, and poems about the fruits of the Spirit.

*Heartsongs* and other books by Mattie Stepanek, poet and peacemaker.

*Light from Many Lamps* by Lillian E. Watson is a treasury of inspiration offering insight and guidance on the challenges of daily life.

*Sitting By My Laughing Fire* by Ruth Graham. The poems in this book could well be termed the footprints of a pilgrim.

*2000 Years of Classic Christian Prayers* by Owen Collins combines poetry and prose, topically arranged.

*The World in Time*, edited by Elizabeth Gray Vining, contains prayers, poetry, and prose selections, with comments by the editor.
